
Dear LSC Campus Community:

Although extraordinarily difficult, the trial of Derek Chauvin has also been a powerful expression of our collective demand for racial justice. This is to be expected: meaningful social change is rarely easy or quick.

Through Equity 2030, we have set the ambitious goal of eliminating educational equity gaps at every Minnesota State college and university by 2030. As our organizing principle, it provides an equity lens to



everything we do and guides us as we strive to create an inclusive and anti-racist organizational ethos.

In the context of this trial, compounded by the tragic death of Daunte Wright, deep feelings of outrage, fear, and grief are natural and to be expected. As a community of learners, we must redouble our efforts to achieve equity, inclusion, and racial justice. We must redouble our efforts in this critical work and stay focused on providing opportunities for all Minnesotans to create a better future for themselves, for their families, and for their communities.

One way each of us can begin to take action today is to be kind to each other. Reach out to your friends and colleagues. Be kind

to yourself and pay attention to your health and wellbeing.

Remember: these difficult events, compounded by the twin pandemics of systemic racism and COVID have been so very hard on everyone.

And it is also clear that healing must begin. Our institutions of higher education are uniquely positioned to model the path forward, address systemic racism that permeates our society, and begin to heal social divides.
